Vanessa's foreword


2024 has been another year of building solid foundations across our Benefice, and I continue to be amazed, delighted and grateful at all that God is doing, and the enthusiasm with which so many of you are joining in that work! There are three areas which we have been particularly working on this year, and I would like to highlight these.

Our first foundation is our identity as a Christian community. It was a source of much rejoicing as we went on a journey of exploring the topic of 'inclusive church' to find that there was overwhelming agreement amongst us that we should indeed join up to the Inclusive Church movement. Through surveys, feedback and conversation we discovered that it was important to us that all our churches across

the Benefice would celebrate and affirm all people who came through our doors — without discrimination against gender, sexuality, disability, race or on any other grounds. We recognise that we might not get this right all the time, but this is the culture and ethos we are working hard to form. As part of that work, it was wonderful to see our building project come to fruition at All Saints, as we now have internal step free access through the building to the accessible toilets, and a new kitchen and meeting room for hire.

Activities and impact

Welcome Café

The Welcome Café continues to be open from 10 – 12 every Thursday morning with support from the PCC. It is a popular meeting place and offers pastoral care for those within the parish and beyond. We welcome around 50 people each week and love seeing new friendships being made.

Children and Families Work

Messy Church



Messy Church is held on the first Sunday of each month. We usually welcome between 30 - 40 people to Messy Church. There is a wonderful

mix of ages which brings a great opportunity to learn from each other.

We regularly have a band of between five and seven, a mix of adults and young people, leading the worship at Messy Church.



Sunshine Saints

Sunshine Saints is the baby and toddler group we run at All Saints on Friday morning. We usually welcome between 8 - 12 children and their parents/carers. The relationships we are are building with our families are going from strength to strength.

The volunteers we have are a real asset, but their numbers remain low. We would benefit from more volunteers, as those we have do wish to take a break some weeks.

Messy Play at St Mark's

At the church fete we ran messy play for children to enjoy. We used this to promote Sunshine Saints and Forest Church.

Easter Activities

An Easter craft session at All Saints was

filled within 24 hours. The theme was Easter, and all the activities were for the children to take away. We welcomed 28 children, plus their parents and carers.

Arthur's Play Space, who rent the church hall, teamed up with us and provided a place for younger children to play and enjoy themselves once they had completed crafts.

Summer Activities

We invited families to join us at craft sessions in August.. These sessions were lots of fun for those who came along and we had encouraging comments from families about the activities we

arranged. Unfortunately, we weren't able to provide activities for very young children and this did affect the numbers of children who attended this Summer. Without volunteers, these sessions would not have been possible, so a huge thanks to everyone involved.

Holiday Meals 2024

This August we invited families to join us for pizza, hotdogs, fruit and treats while watching a different film each week. We also provided activities, based on the film we were showing, for children to enjoy.

We prepared 61 meals in total on each Thursday in August. This number was lower than August 2023. However, those who came commented that they enjoyed the opportunity to be out of the house and go somewhere with their children.

Craft Sessions 2024

We were able to run a craft session during the February half term. This was popular and attended by families with children in Sunshine Saints. Arthur's Play Space joined us for this session, so families with young children could use the play space while older children enjoyed crafts with us.

Christmas activities


Mary & Joseph travelled through the Community during December. This worked well and many photos were posted on our Facebook page. Mary and Joseph finished their travels at the Crib Service in All Saints on Christmas Eve.

Messy Christingle, a combined Messy Church and Christingle service, attracted a congregation of 44.

A combined Crib Service and Christingle on Christmas Eve at St Mark's Church had a

congregation of 103. Meanwhile, 18 people worshipped at a Crib Service at All Saints.

The changes to date and format of Christingle saw attendance increase substantially from last year's disappointing numbers.

Other activities

Café Church

As a complement to our monthly Messy Church, we run café church in St Mark's rooms on first Sundays. This is a chance to meet and enjoy coffee and a snack. Each month we engage with a bible passage in an accessible way and use an activity to think creatively about the topic. This service is streamed to allow those who struggle to get to church to join in with our worship.

Forest Church

Ampfield's Forest Church has been a hit with families and others, drawing in people who might not attend indoor services. Starting in July, we hosted four sessions this year, offering activities like bark rubbing, scavenger hunts, and "forest bathing" along with bread making, pumpkin carving and not forgetting doughnuts, and toasted marshmallows! Despite favorable weather, wellies are always at the ready.



Forest Church has fostered a deeper appreciation for God's creation and gratitude towards the God who made it; we look forward to more outdoor fun in 2025.

Digital and Social Hubs

Both groups run on a Wednesday morning. Digital hub offers people drop-in help with their digital devices. Thank you to Sue Perdue and François Hugo for the help that they have offered. Social Hub provides a warm space in winter and otherwise an opportunity just to meet people over refreshments. Recently, more mums have started to join us.

North Baddesley Village Day

We rent a pitch at this annual event to promote the activities that take place in and around the churches in North Baddesley. It helps us connect with the community outside of church and share information about our services.

North Baddesley BUPA Care Home

As part of a shared ministry with other churches in the village we take a monthly service. This has been a lovely way of connecting with the residents and their families. In December the churches all met together for carol singing in the home.

Heritage Open Days

We were able to contribute exhibitions at St. John the Baptist and St. Mark entitled 'Windows into the Past' looking at and through the windows in the churches and their history. We made some interesting discoveries relating to the past incumbents of Ampfield. The open days are all about free access to heritage sites and we hope to continue to encourage people to learn more about our buildings.

St. John the Baptist Churchyard

There has been more of a challenge in keeping the churchyard in order. Unfortunately, North Baddesley Parish Council have been unable to continue funding the grass cutting. As well as meeting the extra cost, we continue to organise work parties in the Spring and Summer to keep the boundaries tidy.

Harvest lunch

Having not held a harvest lunch for some years, one was held in St Mark's room, instead of the village hall. This was successful and popular, with not only a meal but a quiz and a raffle. It is hoped that this will become an annual event.

Friends for lunch

Numbers attending lunches in St Mark's room continue to average 20 per month. We have six helpers, all from the local community. They are not regular church-

goers and this is a good way of encouraging local involvement in St Mark's. Ron meets and greets, collects money, runs the quiz and raffle and Pam deals with bookings and finances. We continue to provide a two-course meal for 10 months of the year, including a cold buffet in June and tea outside in July. We donated £500 to charities this year. Three Lent lunches were served and around £220 was raised for the Romsey Foodbank and Winchester Night Shelter.

70th Anniversary of All Saints

We were delighted to be able to celebrate 70 years of the building of All Saints Church in April this year with a tea party. A display showed the evolution of All Saints from a small chapel to today's church and hall. We also looked towards future alterations and additions. Members of the community were invited and a cake was made in the shape of the original chapel. Thank you to ROMDAG (Romsey Dementia Action Group) and The Memory Box Foundation for their support.



Ampfield market

We are still selling bric-a- brac and gifts and our stall is very popular and an important way of developing local relationships with St Mark's. People have been generous with their donations and we raised £677.40. We plan to include more information about St. Mark's on the stall. Members of the clergy attend the market regularly.

The Ampfield Messenger

The Messenger continues to be available online only with Phil managing distribution. It is shared on the Parish Council website and from a link on the parish weekly newsletter. A printed copy is sent to two older parishioners who do not access the internet. Collecting subscriptions is an ongoing problem.

Fundraising

Ride and Stride

Every September all four churches take part part in this event. People are encouraged to be sponsored to walk, ride or drive to different churches. Half the money goes to the Hampshire and Island Historic Churches Trust and the other to the church of their choice. Supporting the HIHCT in this also enables us to to apply for grants.

Craft Markets

These have now been running for over a year at All Saints Church. Local craft people rent a table to sell their wares We sell refreshments and hold a raffle. Each market raises around £250 for the church. We now have a regular core of people who set up stalls at most of the markets.

St Mark's Fete and Dog Show

The Church Fete and Dog Show was again successfully run in June 2024. It retained the new format from 2022, along with the well-established Dog Show, BBQ, cream teas, Pimms, raffle, and games. Whilst still a success, we had fewer attending due to a clash with Braishfield, and also fewer dogs.

Other fundraising

Other successful events run in 2024 included quiz nights and wine tastings. The quiz at All Saints in October was a sell-out, raising over £600.

Churchwardens' reports

St Mark, Ampfield

The Terrier and Log Book are up to date.

The St Mark's Room Project was launched in 2022 to create an accessible spiritual heart to the community. A £25K grant was awarded from TVBC in 2024, but this needs matched funding, and is not enough to progress the remodelling desired, hence we have brought forward the refurbishment work:

Phase 4. St Mark's Labyrinth

Temporary ramps have been installed at the external door to St Mark's Room to make the room wheelchair accessible, and we expect to implement Phase I in 2025 to make the church buildings wheelchair accessible throughout, except for the main door. We hope to start Phase 2 later in 2025, including removal of one step at the main door by raising the external track.

The lead was stolen from the church roof in April 2024. This is the third time in five years, so we've looked hard for an acceptable alternative to replace it. The proposal is to use Terne-coated stainless steel which has no value to make it attractive to thieves, but still a long life expectancy, is recommended by English

Heritage, and weathers to look similar to lead after 12 months. A faculty has been applied for and planning permission will be resubmitted once all the documents are satisfactory.

The report following the Quinquennial Inspection in 2022 outlined work needed, primarily to the stonework and roof, which includes high level damp patches on the ceiling either side of the nave, and above the porch. The porch roof repair was completed in the autumn; the rest was delayed until spring 2025. Plans for repair of the high-level flat roof and for stonework repairs will follow once funding is in place.

A Net Zero Audit has been carried out, which gives us a plan for reducing our energy usage, which fits well with our plans to refurbish St Mark's Room to make it more sustainable. In the church the focus is on heating the people rather than the building. We are reviewing the report to develop a plan which will take several years to implement.

The Friends of St Mark's are focused on raising funds to maintain the heritage and quality of St Mark's Church, to encourage the local community to engage and use the building and appreciate its value.

The Friends have been active with fundraising events including two quizzes, a winetasting evening, and the Autumn coffee morning. There was also carol singing at Christmas in local pubs to raise money for Crisis, and an informal Community Carol Service with mince pies and mulled wine which was much enjoyed by many.

The churchyard has had much of the rhododendron cut back, with further work needed. As a result of a tree survey, sadly, two trees had to be felled, including a splendid Himalayan Cedar south of the main door.

St John and All Saints, North Baddesley

The church warden's role became an even busier one than usual in 2024 after Mark West retired at the APCM and North Baddesley PCC went down to just one church warden. Mark had done six years in office during which time he dealt with Covid, an interregnum, the appointment of a new vicar and training a new church warden (yours truly). All of this with his unique sense of humour still intact! Although deserving a rest he didn't get away completely. The APCM saw the PCC approve a steering group of present and past churchwardens from the benefice, the vicar and the buildings administrator. This group has provided much-needed support during the year and been a source of knowhow and experience. It perfectly demonstrates how beneficial a single parish benefice will be for the administration and maintenance of our buildings. I would like to take this opportunity to extend my very grateful thanks to Phil Budden, who took on my responsibilities in addition to those of St Mark's when I suffered some ill health during the year.

The year has seen us working towards more sustainable buildings. both in terms of financial viability and their environmental impact. Upgraded LED lighting in All Saints means that the church is better suited to a wide variety of uses and users and takes less energy. Heated pews at St. John's were very welcome at the midnight mass on Christmas Eve and ensures that we are following the principle of heating the users rather than the building. In order to support future fundraising efforts, we commissioned an energy audit for All Saints. We were very pleased to discover that many of the recommendations were actions that we were already considering in order to improve the building's insulation and energy consumption.

From a financial viability point of view the completion of our new meeting room with attached kitchen has the potential to provide some much-needed income. In addition, the new level access from the church into the hall means that the previously refurbished toilets are now truly accessible across the building ensuring its

suitability for all hirers.

We have taken the opportunity to review several of our service contracts during the year and now have more favourable terms for phone and broadband, fire extinguishers and alarm and our gas contract has joined our electricity supplies under the umbrella of the parish buying scheme. At St. John's, a new grounds maintenance contract with Test Valley Borough Council's Cemeteries and graves division became necessary after the local parish council decided they were no longer able to provide support for this activity. Unfortunately, this increased our costs from £1,000 to £2,448 per annum. We also had to have several dead and diseased trees felled in the churchyard but this does provide us with an opportunity to improve biodiversity with a re-planting scheme.

New security cameras to the front and rear of All Saints and improved external sensor lighting have made the darker winter nights safer for users of the hall and the church.

There is also a small army of dedicated and hard-working volunteers without whom most of these things would not be possible.

Looking after both our buildings and the people in them is essential if we are to continue to position ourselves at the centre of village life ready to share God's love with all.

Safeguarding

It has been another busy year as we strive to keep up to date with the high standards that the Diocese demands. These standards and our progress are logged onto a Dashboard, one for each parish, which can be updated in real time. The Benefice Safeguarding Officer's (BSO) role is to ensure that PCCs are aware of their roles and responsibilities in creating and maintaining safe spaces, for people to worship, relax and play in. I am delighted that all three parishes have achieved level 3 (the highest level), although that does mean the standards are also higher.

This year with the support of Beth and Abbie, we now have role descriptions for most of the roles within our churches, which also includes the level of safeguarding training and level of DBS check, where it is required. Our aim is to complete all the role descriptions within the next few months.

In October, I attended a networking event for safeguarding leads at Old Alresford Place. This was led by the Diocesan Safeguarding Team and was a great opportunity to learn and share.

I completed Safeguarding Leadership Training, which has to be updated every three years. It has changed to use a much more reflective model: a very positive change. One of the outcomes of the training was that the churches now have Safe Spaces posters, with tear off telephone numbers, in all church toilets across the benefice. These phone numbers are an addition to the ones on the safeguarding posters. Safe Spaces is a specialist organisation who are there to listen and support people who have experienced abuse.

In November we took part in Safeguarding Sunday, an annual event promoted by the Church of England, to focus people's attention onto this important topic. It also happened to be the week that the Makin Review was published, and the subsequent resignation of Justin Welby, meaning Safeguarding Sunday was elevated to a whole new level. Personally, I found the review very distressing, and I know I am not alone in this, but I did have some positive feedback after the service, so I think it helped all of us in some way.

My thanks, as always, to the Vicar, Ministry Team and all PCC members who are unstinting in their commitment to safeguarding and their support for me as BSO. Without them, I could not achieve all that we do.

We are lucky to have Arthur's Play Space as long-term hirers of the All Saints church hall and the North Baddesley Community Library and Brownies making use of the church. Our new meeting room should provide further



opportunities for hire income. This year we have added a weekly, term-time session with Southampton Music Bugs. Looking forward to 2025, we are hoping to take bookings for a choir and a dance class.

St Denys has hosted lunchtime recitals and talks. These started in 2023 and we have been able to enjoy performances most months. We are always looking for new choirs, musicians and speakers as we look to fill our roster for 2025 (and beyond)!

Trustees' report

This is the combined PCC trustees' report for the year ended 31 December 2024. Statements apply to all PCCs unless otherwise attributed. The statements are in line with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP FRS 102).

Aims and purpose

The PCCs work with the vicar, Reverend Vanessa Lawrence, in living out the life of the church and promoting themission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical in all three parishes within the benefice. The PCCs are also responsible for maintaining the church buildings.

Objectives and activities

acnbchurch is the Church of England worshipping community in the three parishes of Ampfield, Chilworth and Norh Baddesley. The church exists to promote the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England.

The PCCs are guided by the benefice Mission Action Plan (bMAP) and consider the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, specifically that relating to the advancement of religion.

We are proud to be an inclusive church with a ministry team, volunteers and congregations who show their faith through patterns of worship, prayer, pastoral care, social engagement and support of mission.

Achievements and impact

A fuller account of selected, significant activities can be found at pages 8-11.

We offer a range of services, from BCP, through Common Worship to Fresh Expressions. Ampfield and North Baddesley have regular Sunday morning services; St Denys on three Sundays each month. Our Café Church and Messy Church sessions run on first Sundays. We hold Midweek services at St Mark (Tuesday morning) and All Saints. (Wednesday evenings).

Café Church is streamed via YouTube and there is a BCP Evening Prayer every Sunday on Zoom.

We have 37 (12 resident in parish), 8 (2 resident in parish) and 43 (32 resident in parish) people on the electoral rolls (for Ampfield, Chilworth and North Baddesley, respectively). A new electoral roll will be compiled in 2025.

There have been 11 baptisms, 8 weddings and 19 funerals (plus many interments of ashes) across year.

Deanery synod

Our Deanery Synod representatives from across the benefice are Gill Watkin, Pam Morffew and Sally Kerson. Deanery Synod met three times in 2024.

We were pleased to host the February meeting at All Saints. Sally gave a presentation about the Small Pilgrim Places network and how churches can join. There was a discussion on church accessibility and welcoming people not just on Sundays.

Other topics in 2024 have included CMF and stewardship, a talk from Christians Against Poverty, and overseas partnerships.

Fabric

There is a fuller description of our programme of building works at page 15.

St John the Baptist is open at weekends; St Mark, and St Denys are able to be open during the day for visitors and for prayer. St Denys joined St John's as a member of the Small Pilgrim Places network.

Mission and evangelism

We continue our support to the Romsey Foodbank and Romsey Young Carers. As described in the financial review, below, we make charitable donations and raise funds for other charities.

The Ampfield Messenger is distributed

online via our website. The website, streaming services and social media are also important tools for outreach.

Financial review

Across the benefice, finances are healthy and we are anticipating becoming a single-parish benefice.

Ampfield

Total unrestricted funds at year end are £21,994. Total restricted funds are £11,774. CBF Deposit Funds total £16,048.

Total receipts on the unrestricted fund was £52,899 with total payments of £56,166. This represents a modest deficit. The figures are influenced by the balance of a significant legacy of £11,774 that has allowed some work to the hall and building to carried out.

Giving and Gift Aid were above budget; donations of £21,556 was just enough to cover Common Mission Fund. Grants from Hampshire County Council and other organisation, plus other fundraising, such as £5,075 from the Fete, has been necessary to meet additional running costs.

Everyone's hard work and generosity has given Ampfield a good year.

The Friends of St Mark's had three successful fund-raising events, including £500 raised through carol singing which was sent to Crisis.

Chilworth

Total unrestricted funds at year end are £21,436. Total restricted funds are £7,590. Investments held in Church of England Investment Funds total £69,624.

Total receipts on the unrestricted fund was £37,521 with total payments of £39,980.

Common Mission Fund is paid in full.

North Baddesley

At year end the balance of funds is £124,036 of which £40,135 is unrestricted funds; £25,225 is designated and £58,676 is restricted. The total income for the year of

£145,594 exceeded total expenditure of £125,356 by around £20,000. Both income and expenditure are significantly higher than 2023. The increase in income is due to a legacy of just over £50,000 (half restricted for St John's; half designated for building work), a one-off donation of £8,000 and a grant of £15,000 towards the building work on the meeting room, kitchen and disabled access at All Saints. The increase in expenditure for 2024 includes installation of pew heaters at St John's (£15,000 from the legacy) and the accessibility building work at All Saints (£30,000; half of which was covered by the grant).

Church and hall hire continues to be an important source of income; supplementing income from donors to ensure that CMF can be paid in full (also noting that this was £3,000 less than in 2023). Fund-raising is also important; craft markets and a quiz evening raised £1,500. Support for other charities is an important part of our mission and in 2024, £2,100 was donated from church funds with an additional £1,000 raised in collections for a range of charities (including Christian Aid, The Rainbow Trust, ROMDAG, NSPCC, MacMillan Cancer Research, UNICEF and Romsey Foodbank).

As income for the year was over £100,000 the PCC needs to register with the Charity Commission.

Reserves policy

Across the parishes, a policy is maintained of reserves equal to three months' financial activity.

This equates to £14,000 for Ampfield, £10,000 for Chilworth and £15,000 for North Baddesley.

Risk management

There are three main risks facing the benefice as a whole.

Buildings

The buildings consume time and money for upkeep. A combination of funds raised and legacies have allowed us to invest in necessary building work and mitigate some of the more immediate risks. We continue

to work with our architect and builders to try and keep ahead of critical maintenance needs.

People

Running the church and associated activities relies on a pool of volunteers, who give generously of their time. It is a relatively small pool. Our main mitigation is the work towards a single-parish benefice to reduce duplication and the number of people needed.

Finance

We are heavily reliant on both the generosity of those within the church who give to support us and income from hall hire and other activities. North Baddesley is reliant on a single hirer for a significant amount of income. We are working to attract additional hirers to spread the risk.

Safeguarding

A fuller report on work on safeguarding is at page 14.

The PCCs have complied with their duty to have due regard to the Bishops' guidance on safeguarding, under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016.

Volunteers

The parishes operate only thanks to the hours of effort poured in by volunteers. The PCCs would like to put on record their thanks to everyone who works across the benefice, often behind the scenes, to make sure that services and events, regular and one-off, run smoothly.

The PCC of North Baddesley wish to particularly note the extraordinary service of Mrs Pam Morffew, who stood down as treasurer this year after 40 years. Thank you, Pam!

Structure, governance and management

Each PCC is constituted and run according to the Church Representation Rules. A PCC consists of the incumbent, churchwardens, an LLM, deanery synod representatives and those elected at the APCM.

The PCCs are the bodies responsible for general decision-making and have overall financial responsibility.

The ministry team (incumbent, churchwardens, LLMs and BCMs) meet regularly to consider matters of worship and mission. It has no delegated decision-making powers in matters that would be decided by the PCC.

To improve benefice-wide planning, a Steering Group has been created. This exists as a subcommittee under CRR M32(I), answerable to all PCCs, with membership from each parish and chaired by the incumbent. The steering group has an annual delegated spending limit of £1,000.

The benefice administrator, Sally Kerson, is an employee and also a trustee, as an LLM and ex officio member of the PCC.

The buildings administrator acts as the (paid) PCC secretary for North Baddesley PCC.

The PCCs are bodies corporate (PCC Powers Measure 1956 and Church Representation Rules 2022) and charities excepted from registration with the Charity Commission.

Trustees are all listed on pages 4 and 5.

No trustees have claimed expenses for their activities as trustees.
